"Uncommon Encounters"

Do you sometimes allow your life to be consumed by depressing news clips or situations? Rev. Carmen Mele, O.P. writes "Eastered people don't close themselves off from the world because of its nonsense. Rather, as Jesus Christ, they show the world what true love is." At Pentecost we concluded the Easter season. We have again been reminded that we have been given the gifts of the Holy Spirit that Jesus promised as He departed His earthly presence to return to His Father.

What was that encounter like when Jesus met his Father face to face? Father Donald Senior in the May 22, 2022 Chicago Catholic writes about Jesus' journey on earth as being two-fold. "On the one level it is a journey from his ministry in the northern region of Galilee to the city of Jerusalem where Jesus' destiny will unfold. On a deeper level the journey in which Jesus is engaged is a journey through death and resurrection to the eternal embrace of his Father at the completion of His mission." Jesus encountered many situations and people in his life on earth; being eternally embraced by His Father was the ultimate Uncommon Encounter.

Recently, a friend of mine, Mary Ellen Durbin, one of the founding members of Daybreak of Lisle, and I planned and facilitated a retreat called Uncommon Encounters for the mentors/volunteers of Daybreak. The term "Uncommon Encounters" intrigued me and challenged me to put a positive spin on encounters.

Since 1989, Daybreak has provided transitional housing and supportive services to homeless families with children so that they can work toward recovering economic and familial stability. The retreat challenged a willing but stressed group of mentors to find the uncommon encounter of Christ within the scope of their work. Uncommon Outcome: on June 29 the executive committee will meet with Matt Zurek, outreach coordinator at St. Joan of Arc, who was very excited about getting younger (40s and 50s) involved in Daybreak. He has been getting calls from people who really want to get involved in helping people in concrete ways.

All the world has been experiencing an uncommon encounter with President Putin and the war in Ukraine. One outcome: Tonya Urkoski, Villa St.

Benedict's liaison with the public, reached out to Sister Ann Hoffman, OSB of Erie, PA and familiarized us with the charitable works of AIM (Alliance for International Monasticism). Over \$10,000 was raised to support Benedictine Sisters in Lviv, Ukraine.

I challenge each of us: Be an Eastered people and show the world what true love is. May we make the most of grace-filled opportunities presented throughout our daily lives, as we look forward to the ultimate uncommon encounter of being eternally embraced by our heavenly Father.

May She Rest in the Peace of the Lord



Sister Carolyn Sieg, OSB July 4, 1939 - January 5, 2022

Excerpts from Reflection written by Sister Christine Kouba. OSB:

Sister Carolyn was born on Independence Day, July 4, 1939, and was brought up on the family's vegetable truck farm on Walnut Avenue in Lisle, Illinois. Joseph and Catherine Sieg were her beloved parents. Carolyn was the youngest child in her family, always tenderly protected by her three brothers and three sisters. Her mother often called her "the joy of her life," as she was a happy child with an enthusiastic spirit.

From childhood, she attended St. Joan of Arc School in Lisle taught by the Benedictine Sisters. She found the Sisters to be gentle, fun loving and prayerful, and she wanted to grow up to be like them. She especially admired her fourth grade

teacher, Sister Mary Patricia Fallon. Later, it became natural to follow the Sisters to Sacred Heart Academy for high school. During her studies at the academy, on April 8, 1954, she decided to enter the postulancy, the first phase of formation in becoming a Benedictine Sister. Not yet 15 years old, but with a strong drive to follow the Lord, she was determined to proceed with her plans. She spent her Novitiate year preparing for the following phase of professing her first vows on June 25, 1956, and in 1960 made her final profession.

With qualifications to be a teacher and doing well in her college classes, she was soon introduced to start her teaching ministry. It was exciting for her to be sent to parochial schools - first to Fort Worth, Texas, then to Chicago and later to Cicero, as well as to her home school at St. Joan of Arc for 2 years. Through the experience of teaching every grade except second grade in these schools, she was ready for greater challenges.

The brightest light of her ministry in education came in 1967. With a background in teaching, a degree in education from St. Mary of the Woods College in Indiana, and soon to have a Masters in Administration from St. Thomas University in St. Paul, she was ready to take over the daunting job of principal of St. Joan of Arc School. The enrollment was over 500 students. preschool to eighth grade. However, she was not intimidated, rather, she immediately loved her ministry at St. Joan of Arc School and as she put it, "she pitched her tent there to be ready for her adventure in service."

St. Joan of Arc School became her passion, impelling her to keep learning useful educational guidelines, envisioning potential ways to be attentive to every student and to set up programs of teaching through the years to benefit the whole student body according to their level and ability. She would take an interest in every individual child's learning progress. She knew that she needed always to pray with the children to remind them that God loved each of them and would always be ready to help them. She included students to take part in the Morning Prayer Ritual on the loudspeaker. Her aim, as well, was to keep inspiring the teachers to have an optimistic, Christcentered attitude in the classroom in order to integrate the curriculum with an environment of respect and companionship for one another. She wanted all children in her care to be regarded as "sacred vessels of the altar", quoting St. Benedict. She often told parents that Catholic school education isn't finished at any point in life; learning the "good news" of the Gospel is a forever learning endeavor; an ongoing, joyful journey to reach eternal life.

As the principal, Sister Carolyn mentored the parents of the students and shared her leadership role with the pastor of the parish. She called her threefold responsibility to the pupils, their parents and the pastor her "three P" duty.

Sister Carolyn's exceptional visionary attention in conceiving the addition of classroom space, a learning center, a gymnasium, and a computer lab was very important for the betterment of the school, but just as important was her dynamic, inspirational leadership. She took time to listen to the needs of everyone in her care and was able to offer

solutions with her helpful insights. Her focus for the total five decades of serving St. Joan of Arc School was always student-centered.



In the school year of 1985-86, the United States Department of Education recognized St. Joan of Arc as a school of excellence and gave national recognition to the accomplishments of Sister Carolyn Sieg as principal and her faculty and staff. In receiving the award in Washington, D.C., she was able to meet with President Reagan in the White House with almost 300 other elementary school principals who also received this distinctive recognition. In 2010, Sister Carolyn Sieg received another leadership award, "The Bishop Kaffer Outstanding Principal Award" from the Diocese of Joliet. She was chosen by all the elementary and secondary schools in the Diocese of Joliet, known for her innovation and technology in the classroom, as well as creating a high morale with the staff, students and parents and for fostering professional growth of the staff. Her unifying spirit resulted in a family

atmosphere at the school in that everyone was welcome.

We know that Sister Carolyn's 2 years of teaching plus her 48 years of principalship equaled 50 years of a loving relationship with the people of St. Joan of Arc parish and school. At her retirement in 2015, she credited the St. Joan of Arc people who worked closely with her to accomplish the work mapped out for them and thanked them for their continuous partnership in her 50 years.

As a member of our monastery, Sister Carolyn was known as a person of loving kindness. She tried to remember each Sister on her birthday or with a get-well card when she was sick. She loved to develop her personal association by encouraging the good that the Sisters were doing. She had an attitude of gratitude that was her significant attribute in community life. Her ability to speak up and support a good cause was the reason that she was acknowledged for leadership roles throughout her monastic life as a council member.

After her retirement from her role as principal at St. Joan of Arc, though afflicted with health issues, she was active in interviewing and later mentoring new principals in the Joliet Diocese. She was also active in tutoring our international Benedictine Sisters studying at Benedictine University.

Her presence here at the monastery will be missed, but knowing that she is happy in God's loving embrace is reason to rejoice. Her patient suffering is being rewarded. Let us give thanks to our most loving sacred heart of Jesus for her good life!

In gratitude as Benedictine Sisters, we want to express our sincere thanks to Sister Carolyn's sister Donna Gray and her wonderful family, who did so much in providing care and comfort for many years in support of Sister Carolyn, especially being with her continuously in her dying moments. May God's abundant blessings uplift all of you knowing that she is at peace.

Seventeenth Annual Day of Reflection for Women "A New Perspective on: Courage, Compassion & Confidence"

Sponsored by the Office of Religious Education Archeparchy of Pittsburgh, PA

On May 7th, sixty-seven women gathered at the Byzantine Catholic Cathedral Center of St. John the Baptist in Munhall, PA to pray together and reflect on the qualities needed to remain spiritually & physically healthy. Mindful of the war in Ukraine, the setup for the day included the colors of Ukraine and sunflowers. The day opened with a prayer service for the women and children of Ukraine.



Our first presenter was Dr. Regina Poletunow Boerio, Ph.D, a Professor of Psychology at Franciscan University in Steubenville, Ohio. Her clinical interests include anxiety, depression and women's issues. She gave specific examples on how we can show compassion to others and grow in self-compassion. Regina's excellent Power Point presentation included a few scenes of the plight of women and children in Ukraine and the outpouring of compassionate assistance to this war-torn country.

The second presentation was given by Andrea Wedner. She is truly a "Woman of Valor." (Proverbs 31:10). This is the opening line from the poem honoring a righteous woman in Proverbs. It is sung every week on Friday night at the Sabbath meal and read at the funeral of a Jewish woman. On October 27, 2018 during morning service at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh, PA Andrea was seriously wounded in a vicious attack on the Jewish community. Her 97-year-old mother, Rose Mallinger was killed along with 10 other worshippers. In the midst of tragedy and grief, she finds


support and healing in her family, friends and community. She told her story with courage, dignity and grace. Her inner resiliency and ability to heal from the hurt was a gift to all present.

Our final presenter was Alissa West. Alissa graduated from Elizabethtown College in 2004 with a Bachelor of Music in Music Therapy. For over ten years, she provided services for individuals of all ages with physical and developmental disabilities at Matheny Medical and Educational Center in NJ and Arts & Services, Inc. in Los Angeles, CA. This mandate, found in the Hebrew scriptures, the Gospels, and reiterated by Benedict to be the cornerstone for our interaction with one another (Rule of Benedict, Chapter 72) and our reception of strangers & guests (RB 53), is our particular corporate response to the needs of this 21st century.

We are proclaiming our commitment to hospitality as one significant way of being counter-cultural in the midst of global fear and mistrust. We are determined to create an environment of non-violence among ourselves that will allow our own members to experience gentle warmth and reverence for the gift each is to the community. We will create an atmosphere in which the stranger will be recognized as a guest - received as Christ Himself - the gift of God among us.

We are willing to risk and model that strangers, coming together as friends, can nourish one another in the prayerful atmosphere of cenobitic community, can share resources, can host and reverence the other as sacred. In the act of "opening our door" to the other, we in fact open our hearts - emptying ourselves of ourselves. This will be our gift to those "who knock." With open hands, we receive the gift they are to us.
