# Message from the Prioress...

I begin this greeting on the Feast of the Solemnity of Pentecost, elated to reflect on the joys of the Gospel through the lens of our new Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV. Those of you in Chicagoland may already know that our chaplain, Father Becket Franks, OSB, attended St. Augustine Seminary High School at the same time as Pope Leo - then simply "Bob." In fact, his yearbook is fondly signed by him.

On Easter, I vividly recall Father Becket challenging us to "Easter" - to live out the Good News of the Resurrection, just as Mary of Magdala and the Apostles did after the Resurrection and Pentecost. It struck me how Pope



Francis lived that very challenge when, despite illness, he rose from his bed on Easter Day to proclaim that Jesus's life, death, and Resurrection offer us the gift of salvation. What a profound gift Pope Francis has been to the Church and to the world - and now, what a gift we have in Pope Leo. Their Christian witness calls us to walk in peace, serve with love, and care deeply for the world entrusted to us.

The fifty days of Easter assure us that Jesus truly died and rose again, and that the Holy Spirit now dwells among us, guiding and sustaining our lives. The teachings of Pope Francis and now Pope Leo continue to spread this living message of hope and transformation.

And yet, we find ourselves in a world marked by deep religious and political division. The messages of Pope Francis, Pope Leo, and other faith leaders are sometimes seen as conflicting with Church tradition or the teachings of Jesus. This, too, echoes Christ's experience. He lived in a divided world, where His message was often in tension with prevailing religious and social norms. His claim to be the Son of God was too radical for many - and ultimately led to His crucifixion.

But the story did not end there. After encountering the risen Christ, the Apostle Paul gave his life to proclaiming the Easter message and ultimately died for it. Early Christian martyrs were also put to death for their unwavering faith in Jesus's teachings. We, too, are called to proclaim and live this truth with courage.

There are good and faithful people on all sides of the religious and political spectrum. I, for one, live in a Benedictine faith community, and my own journey - shaped by my education at Loyola University and its grounding in Vatican II theology - continues to be nurtured by the teachings of Popes John XXIII and Francis, and now I am deeply hopeful and energized to see Pope Leo XIV continue in their footsteps.

As Pope Leo reminds us:

"The Spirit inspires the contemplative dimension of life that rejects self-assertion, complaining, rivalry, and the temptation to control consciences and resources."

The Holy Spirit changes the world - because the Holy Spirit changes hearts.

### Jesus is Risen. Indeed. He is Risen!

His message continues to open hearts around the world.

May visiting the *PAX AETERNA* statue and walking in the footsteps of Mary, our Mother, bring blessings and lead us all to live as true children of God.



### **Blessed Are the Peacemakers**

Years ago, the Benedictine Sisters' Stewardship Committee identified a goal: create a peace garden on their grounds. When? Someday.

Last year the stars aligned. The delighted community and their guests gathered in the splendor of the new garden to bless it on Friday, May 30, 2025.



Situated near the east entrance to the monastery, the welcoming space perfectly manifests the Benedictine charism of hospitality. The focal point is peace personified in the dynamic statue *Pax Aeterna* created by sculptor Larry Johnson, proprietor of LK Johnson Studio.

It was Sister Helen Jilek, Stewardship Committee Chairman, who found the path to achieve the goal. She and the late Sister Judith Ann Heble developed a friendship with the sculptor some six years ago when they commissioned him to make a statue of St. Benedict as a gift to Villa St. Benedict for the west entrance. Fortuitously, last year he mentioned to Sister Helen that he had designed a statue he named *Pax Aeterna*. Those Latin words mean Peace Everlasting. When Sister Helen heard the name and saw his drawing, she knew she had found the centerpiece for a peace garden.

Mr. Johnson included Sister Helen throughout his process of honing the clay, inviting her to recommend "edits." He also had her select the patina.

Matt Haber, Design Director at Western DuPage Landscaping, planned the beautiful plantings. His design showcases not only the statue, but the stonework that was already in place. That includes a gentle waterfall, a bridge, paths, and seating. Don Lupo, of Lupo Masonry, Inc., designed and installed the stone pedestal for the statue.

At the dedication ceremony, the Benedictine Sisters formally gifted the garden to Villa St. Benedict. Sister Mary Bratrsovsky, Prioress, created a deeply meaningful prayer service for the occasion. It was replete with words of peace: scripture readings, Popes' messages, and petitions. Many members of the community participated in the readings. Grateful acknowledgements are due Sister Jo Anne Form for her skillful design of the pamphlet, Sister Alberta Khwela for power washing all the stonework, and Nick and Nick of Nick & Sons Landscaping for installing the water feature and mulch.

# May She Rest in the Peace of the Lord



Sr. Regina Ann Weissmann, OSB May 20, 1935 - January 31, 2025

Sister Regina Ann was born in Chicago on May 20, 1935 to Henry and Martha Walovich Weissmann and was baptized Nancy at St. Michael's Church in Chicago on June 2, 1935. She was graciously raised by her Aunty Agnes, as her parents were both employed. A few years later, she became big sister to Arline and again to her brother Robert, making her family circle complete.

She attended St. Michael's School from kindergarten through eighth grade. The Benedictine Sisters taught there, and her heart was attracted to their way of life. She had hoped to attend the girls boarding high school at Sacred Heart Academy in Lisle, but lack of finances kept her at Lourdes High School, close to home. She remembers herself as a "tomboy" in her younger years, but in high school she focused on her studies. She was an excellent student, named to the National Honor Society, and hoped to go on to college. However, college was not affordable, so she found employment in advertising at a publishing company. This gave her a solid foothold in learning the basics of marketing as well as professionalism, creative writing and public speaking.

In 1958, at age 23, she writes: I REALLY FELT GOD CALLING ME SO I ENTERED THE BENEDICTINE MONASTERY IN LISLE, ILLINOIS." This statement was not only firm and decisive, but also showed a clear desire to follow Jesus. She started by listening carefully with the ear of her heart. Throughout her formation she felt very enriched in practicing the basics of the Rule of Benedict, the Divine Office of prayer, study of Scripture, the mission of the Church and living the Benedictine community life. On August 29, 1960, she made her first Benedictine vows of Stability, Conversion of Morals and Obedience, and later made her perpetual profession on July 26, 1963. After making her first vows she joined other Sisters teaching in parochial schools: St. Mary Immaculate School in Dallas, St. Cyril & Methodius in Joliet, Holy Mount in Cicero and St. Joan of Arc in Lisle, later becoming principal at Our Lady Queen of Peace School in Wichita Falls, Texas.

She also worked for a short period of time at the Monastery. An undated letter of gratitude was found in Sister Regina Ann's file. Sister Mary Regina Dubina, the Prioress at that time, wrote: "Dear Sister Regina Ann, There is no adequate way of telling you how much we appreciated the fantastic job you did for our community as a house coordinator. Your kind and compassionate approach showed us how well you look out for the Sisters and we want you to know we appreciate how hard you worked at it."

With her caring, mission-minded background, she was sent to St. Benedict's College/St. John's University in Collegeville, MN in 1969 where she pursued a B.A. in Psychology. She then continued for her Master's degree at Loyola University in Chicago.

After graduation, Sister Regina Ann was ready to be a skilled psychotherapist and qualified as a Family Life and Teen-Age Adjustment Counselor. She chose the Inter-Faith Family Life Center at Our Savior's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Naperville, where she worked for eight years. She was highly regarded in her position and enriched her background with further knowledge. She took courses such as Clinical

Study in Pastoral Care, as well as Prevention and Rehabilitation of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs.

In 1977, she unexpectedly suffered an overpowering headache, diagnosed as a double brain aneurism, for which she needed high-risk brain surgery. The Benedictine community, family and friends prayed fervently for her recovery. With prayer and therapy, she was able to regain her speech and active participation in life's events. Her recovery was quite miraculous as she returned to apply her interest and skill to counseling. She worked as Director of Adult Formation and Pastoral Care at St. Scholastica's Parish in Woodridge, where she was highly respected. She did marriage counseling and especially loved teaching the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) Program to those interested in becoming members of the Catholic Church.

In 2010, with the development of Villa St. Benedict here in Lisle, CEO Kathy DiCristina was happy to have Sister Regina Ann fill a need in helping residents, especially newcomers, adjust to their new environment. Providing pastoral care, she trained those who wanted to be Eucharistic ministers and lectors at Mass, while remaining available for counseling any private concerns. Again, she was very happy doing this work.

After several years with good health, she became noticeably debilitated. Fracturing her ankle in a fall, she was hospitalized, and gradually suffered from

depression and then symptoms of dementia. She was accepted at St. Patrick's Residence in Naperville, where she remained for several years. There she was lovingly cared for by the Carmelite Sisters and their efficient staff, and later by Angel Care Hospice.

Often times we wonder why some sick people, like Sister Regina Ann, linger for years without having a seeming purpose in life. Yet, in God's eyes, her life was unimaginably precious and held a value that could not be measured by numerical calculations. Not one ounce of the love, time and attention given to her was wasted, and she returned that love and gratitude with a smile. Carmelite Sisters Kathleen and Raphael said that when they brought her Holy Communion, Regina Ann would sit up in bed, fold her hands and smile in anticipation. She must have been very aware of Jesus' presence in the Holy Eucharist.

Angel Care Hospice nurses Susan and Liz and hospice volunteer Liza were thrilled to receive a loving smile whenever they entered her room at St. Patrick's Residence. This all speaks of the peace she must have had in her heart. As she lived so she died, presenting herself to God in gratitude for the gift of life on January 31, 2025.

Having participated in the Rush Religious Alzheimer's Study Program since 2000, she donated her brain for further research at death. This too was her life-giving benefit to others.


# Benedictine Sisters of the Byzantine Rite

### "Do Whatever He Tells You" (Jn. 2:11)

Most Christians are familiar with the first miracle of Jesus at the Wedding Feast of Cana. The dialogue between mother and son continues to baffle spiritual writers as we try to break open the conversation, specific directions and definitely, non-verbal communication.

On Saturday, May 17, 2025 women came together at Kearns Spirituality Center, Allison Park, PA to reflect on this Gospel passage. Rev. Liddy Barlow, Executive Minister of Christian Associates of Southwest PA guided the group by addressing three themes: "Noticing", "The Exchange"



and "Following Directions." The miracle of the wine was great, but greater still is the miracle of Mary's persistence. Rev. Liddy's reflection helped the attendees gain greater insight into the depth of a mother's heart and who Mary must be in God's eyes if she has such persuasiveness.

The afternoon included two presenters: Father Thomas Bailey, OSB, a member of the Benedictine Marmion Abbey in Aurora, IL and Director of Human Formation at the Byzantine Catholic Seminary of SS Cyril & Methodius and Amanda Singel. Amanda is the Business Manager for *God With Us Publications* and Assistant to the Office of Religious Education. The title of Fr. Bailey's talk was "*From Empty Jars to Overflowing Grace.*" He reminded participants that we are "empty jars" overflowing with grace in our loving interactions with others. Using examples from the lives of holy women we can see them as models and enjoy the benefits of their experiences during their time here on earth. Among the many examples shared, Fr. Bailey acquainted the group with the story of St. Benedict and his twin sister, St. Scholastica, which is another example of "persuasiveness" and how God works in our lives. If you are not familiar with this story, check it out.

We know wine is mentioned several times in the Bible. So is cheese. (Job 10:10, 1 Sam. 17:18, & 2 Sam. 17:29.) The day ended with an experience to *"Taste and See That the Lord is Good."* Thank you to Amanda Singel for preparing a delightful activity on pairing wine & cheese.

This program could not have been accomplished without the help of a loving and supportive committee, the intercession of Mary and all the holy women who remind us that the spiritual does not go against having a good time!

### **Unity in Diversity**

All of us are trying to wrap our brain around a new Pope who speaks English without an accent! How grateful we are for Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost from Chicago who said, "Yes" to God's call in accepting a responsibility that is beyond our comprehension.

Eastern Catholics especially are being mesmerized by our new

Catholicism began to appear at his Inauguration Mass celebrated at St. Peter's Square at the Vatican on May 18, 2025, showing that the "East" is very much a part of the Church. The Gospel at the Mass was proclaimed in two languages, Latin & Greek, reminding us that the Church breathes with two lungs, East & West. The beautiful icon of **Our Lady of Good Council** was noticeably visible. This Byzantine style Madonna, a favorite of Pope Leo's, speaks to us about his devotion to Mary and his appreciation of icons as "windows into heaven." At the consecration of the Mass, the pope held over the Eucharistic bread an "asterisk." This is a star-shaped symbol placed on the paten (diskos) symbolizing the star of Bethlehem. This symbol recalls the hidden and early life of God. Before the homily Pope Leo greeted his audience with the Paschal greeting used for forty days in the Eastern Churches, "Christ is Risen! He is Truly Risen!"






















# Villa St. Benedict



We, the Benedictine Sisters of Sacred Heart Monastery, Lisle, Illinois, proclaim hospitality to be our corporate commitment. This mandate, found in the Hebrew scriptures, the Gospels, and reiterated by Benedict to be the cornerstone for our interaction with one another (Rule of Benedict, Chapter 72) and our reception of strangers & guests (RB 53), is our particular corporate response to the needs of this 21st century.

We are proclaiming our commitment to hospitality as one significant way of being

counter-cultural in the midst of global fear and mistrust. We are determined to create an environment of non-violence among ourselves that will allow our own members to experience gentle warmth and reverence for the gift each is to the community. We will create an atmosphere in which the stranger will be recognized as a guest - received as Christ Himself - the gift of God among us.

We are willing to risk and model that strangers, coming together as friends, can nourish one another in the prayerful atmosphere of cenobitic community, can share resources, can host and reverence the other as sacred. In the act of "opening our door" to the other, we in fact open our hearts - emptying ourselves of ourselves. This will be our gift to those "who knock." With open hands, we receive the gift they are to us.
